seasonal beverage!


In ELA, students learned about symbolism and designed their own version of an ugly sweater. They then used what they learned to decorate a cookie.
















## FIFTH GRADE SCIENCE: REIMAGINING HOUSES


Students have been working with an architect from Carnegie Mellon University and staff from the Carnegie Museum of Art to learn about architecture. We have investigated the following topics:

- How an environment influences the design of a structure, specifically, desert, tropical rainforest, mountains, and hurricane zones;
- Scale and how to create scaled drawings;
- Architectural drawings, plan, section, and façade;
- Types of buildings;
- Features of different construction materials;
- Construction of arches.

Working with their group, students have designed a plan for a house that will be suitable for their assigned environment. Once the houses are complete, we will have a juried review, and some of the completed houses will be selected to be put on a special display at the Carnegie! The Carnegie is making a 2–3 minute promotional video about CMOA Education which exclusively features the Colfax project with my students!









## FOURTH GRADE **FIELD TRIP** THROUGH SQUIRREL HILL

On Tuesday, October 17, all fourth grade students boarded three buses to embark on a journey throughout Squirrel Hill. Our first stop was at the Carnegie Library on Forbes Ave. It was very interesting to hear about the history of the library and see the operation from the inside-out. We broke into twelve groups, where docents from Pittsburgh History Landmarks Foundation (PHLF) gave us a tour of the beautiful neighborhood; including various stores and restaurants along the way. The intent was to help our students become researchers and investigators. This two-hour field trip was tied to the curriculum (Ready Gen- Unit 1-Becoming Researchers) and helped students to make connections and experience Squirrel Hill from a different lens. The students were given clipboards and worksheets that they were to complete as they walked around with their classmates and tour guides.

Looking ahead, the goal is to have students continue this activity in their own neighborhood. Since Colfax represents multiple neighborhoods, students were asked to write about their own and act as reporters. They were also given the opportunity to interview someone within their neighborhood to help us to gather more information and different perspectives. PHLF will collect these assignments and help us create a "Neighborhood Magazine".

This was a great opportunity to take a closer look at Squirrel Hill and to begin to gain insight about the other neighborhoods in which our students live.

I would also like to extend my gratitude to all the parents who volunteered and made this event an absolute success! The families at Colfax are always ready and willing to go above and beyond, and that's what makes our school such an exceptional place to be!
























## ELEMENTARY UPDATE


