## INTERVIEW WITH AUTHOR SHANA KELLER 2/14/17

Black History Month is where we highlight achievements of people of color. Shana Keller, author of TICKTOCK BANNEKER'S CLOCK visited Colfax for two days, February 14th \& 16th, sharing her incredible picture book. The students learned about Banneker's invention and how they might invent something in the future. Sharing her book awakens the creativity and curiosity of our students, which will last a lifetime. We thank her for taking the time to visit with us and look forward to her future works.


1. What was your inspiration for TICKTOCK BANNEKER?

My inspiration stemmed from Colfax when my daughter attended here some years ago. She was in Mrs. Conroy's 1st grade class. I saw the name Benjamin Banneker and was curious. I took an AFAM class in college and never came across his name. Surprisingly, after my research I found out that he was a landowner and he was born free, which entitled him to go to a Quaker school. His farm is located outside of Baltimore, Maryland.
2. What makes your book different from other books on Benjamin Banneker?

I focus on a specific achievement and one of his earliest inventions. He was an astronomer, scientist and also wrote an almanac. He actually saved Washington D.C. due to being part of the team that surveyed the land for the layout
of the Capitol.
3. How do you feel your book has changed children's literature?

I believe my book has touched the hearts of children by seeing he is a person of color who was free. The book gives a different perspective on history. It also encourages young inventors to be curious.

## INTERESTING FACTS:

- The book took two years from research to print. The publisher found the illustrator, who has also worked on many Disney projects.
- The STEM applications are incredible. Detailing the step by step instructions and how students can apply it to their own lives is truly priceless.

For the second year in a row, our wonderful teachers thought what better way to celebrate this day than giving their students the chance to Pie a Teacher in the Face. Even if you didn't have a chance to witness this fun event in person, these photos will surely bring a smile to your face! The joy and enthusiasm of our teachers couldn't be more evident.




The first grade classes took their winter trip to the Frick Environmental Center as part of the Habitat Explorers program. The students joyfully walked along Beechwood Blvd. from Colfax to the center, chatting and happy to be outside. The Environmental Center staff greeted the students and started their lesson with a review of all the elements necessary for a habitat: food, water, shelter, space, and air.

The students then learned about how different animals adapt as their habitats change with the seasons: migrating bird, hibernating ground hogs, squirrels burying nuts, deer choosing different foods to eat with the seasons. The students then went outside for a woodland walk to explore and look for signs of animals in the park One group even noticed marks on a tree where a deer had been rubbing its antlers!

The final part of the lesson was a stewardship project: making a bagel bird feeder. Vegetable shortening was spread on a stale bagel and then it was dipped in various bird seeds. They must be a big hit with the birds because the only signs of the bird feeders made from the previous class were the lonely strings dangling from the trees! The trip concluded with a healthy snack and a song, "Habitat, Habitat, Have to Have a Habitat to Carry on."




## FRICK HOUSE

The second grade classes made their second field trip to the Henry Clay Frick House in February. Following the 4 seasons with their visits, this was dedicated to winter.

After talking about colorful foliage in the fall, this time they talked about deciduous and evergreen trees. They observed, touched, and drew different tree barks, and then learned how to create wonderful winter scenes using colored paper, scissors, glue and crayons.

During their previous visit, the students planted chives under the direction of Farmer Paul. This visit, they got the chance to see how well their plants had grown. Again with Farmer Paul, the students were excited to chop the chives and other herbs to prepare a delicious and healthy dressing for their salads.

The last, and probably the most exciting part of their trip, was the actual visit to the Frick mansion. The kids were simply amazed! They could not stop wondering and asking questions about the Fricks and their lives, even on the bus during their return to school.

3rd Grade is wrapping up their lessons with Farmer Paul for the winter. To finish things up they learned about simple machines. Did you know there are six (classical) simple machines? (Wheel and Axel, Pulley, Wedge, Incline Plane, Lever, and the Screw) For cooking lessons, students used child-friendly knives to demonstrate how a knife's handle can be viewed as a lever and the tip of the blade as a wedge. They used the knife to chop and prepare green onions and peppers for a tofu noodle salad. They also used a salad spinner to show how a wheel and axel can help us wash our vegetables.

When the weather shot up in to the 60s, the classes were able to learn about simple machines out in the garden! In addition to learning about what weeds are and why we pull them, they worked with hand shovels to show how a simple machine can help get work done in the garden. Once all the weeds are pulled, we will be planting the late winter/early spring cover crop to protect our soil and to give it a boost of nitrogen before the spring garden takes off! Farmer Paul is also busy planning this year's Wake Up the Garden event, which will be coming sometime in May. Please be on the lookout for ways you can participate!

# COMMON THREADS COOKING 

Tuesdays after school, students in grades 3-5 have had the opportunity to participate in Common Threads cooking program. This program engages students' tastes and minds. This global class explores the culture and cuisine of ten countries. In the kitchen, young chefs learn how to follow a recipe, prepare and cook ingredients, and always leave the kitchen as clean as they found it!

The class challenges students to use a wide variety of cooking equipment and ensures that they know how to safely and effectively use each tool, including chef's knives, graters, peelers, stoves, and ovens. Graduates of this program are able to cook a balanced healthy meal.


28 Colfax girls in grades 3-5 have been building skills in leadership, self-esteem, and problem-solving by pairing with college-aged female mentors in the Strong Women Strong Girls program. The program follows a skills-based curriculum to teach the girls life skills such as communication, being determined and persevering through difficulty, as well as lessons in being a strong competitor. They girls have also been studying the biographies of strong women and girls throughout history and currentday heroines.

## PITTSBURGH YOUTH SHAKESPEARE MONOLOGUE AND SCENE CONTEST

One of the many morning enrichment classes students can be placed in, the Shakespeare/August Wilson class, offers the opportunity to compete in the Pittsburgh Youth Shakespeare Monologue and Scene contest. At the beginning of the school year, we began to explore Shakespeare's works by watching films and performances of scenes and plays. We were also told that we were to prepare a scene or monologue from a Shakespeare play to compete at the PPT (Pittsburgh Public Theatre) in the beginning of February. This proved to be a daunting challenge as I had never acted before and wasn't comfortable with it at all. As the groups began to form, I found myself doing a scene with two of my close friends. The process started as looking through many volumes of Shakespeare plays, trying to find interesting scenes meant for three players. We narrowed it down to three person scenes from Hamlet and eventually chose act three scene four. This particular scene entailed murder and accusations of adultery and thievery. I soon learned that preforming and understanding such a scene would be no walk in the park. Performing was no longer saying the words with no clue of their meaning, it was understanding what we were saying and who we were playing. I had to ask myself questions such as, "How would Hamlet react to the knowledge of his mother's wrongdoings?" or "What motions would go a long with the mood and the script?" These deep questions are difficult to answer and can only be explained through acting, something every person in the enrichment had to learn to do.

All of the students were required to be "off book" by the beginning of January, meaning that everyone had their lines and movements memorized. Many scenes and monologues were ahead of the deadline, and everyone soon caught up. It was around this time that our classes acting coach arrived, Karen Baum. Karen is a local actor here in Pittsburgh, and entirely lovely in every way. She was excellent with working with us on drastically improving our acting, speaking, and interpretation skills. All of her advice
helped us match our words to our action, our emotions to our character's emotions. She helped us become actors and actresses. Though we only met with her on my scene three or four times, she completely changed the way that we viewed and played our characters.

The competition itself was on February 7th, 2017, and nerves were running high in the days before. Rehearsals and practices became much more frequent and serious. My team members insisted on constantly reviewing and practicing our scene, which soon got on my nerves. We were the first in line to preform from our school, and weren't going to have any time in advance to think about how to position ourselves on the unfamiliar stage. The morning of the competition was the most nerve wracking of them all, partially due to the hour delay of Colfax's segment of the competition. The hours before were spent confiding our worries in each other and supporting our friends. Everyone from Colfax was seated inside the theatre and our scene was called. As we introduced ourselves to the judges, it began. Everything went so quickly and all of my nerves went away. We were preforming in a competition and were doing well. Relieved at our apparent success, my scene members and I sat down. The rest of Colfax's performances were excellent and blew me away. For me, the takeaway was learning how to be someone else and conquering my fears of doing something outside of my comfort zone. It was an amazing experience and I would do it all again.



After the months of preparation spent with student mentors from Carnegie Mellon University, Mr. Wolfe's CMU Science Squad headed to Duquesne University for the Pennsylvania Junior Academy of Science Region 7 Competition the first week in February. The student who earned a 1st place (the competition is based on accrued points), will travel to Penn State for 3 days to partake in the state level competition on May 14-16.

The commitment of the students to this process should make us all very proud of them. This is our 11th year offering this program at Colfax, and with 27 7th and 8th grade students, it is the largest yet. Mr Wolfe has had over 254 students participating over the years. The success of this program is rooted in Dr. Kisslinger's passion for this program, the dedication of the students, the direct support of their parents, and the support of so many at Colfax from teachers, coaches, and the administrators, and especially Mr. Wolfe!
